

Enter Welcome to ACSOC: A New Era for Collaborative Cybersecurity


We are pleased to officially launch the ACSOC project — Advanced Cooperative Security Operation Centres — funded by the Digital Europe Programme.

In response to the growing complexity of cyber threats across Europe, ACSOC is advancing a new generation of Al-enabled, federated, and collaborative Security Operation Centres (SOCs). The project focuses on enhancing the capacity of SOCs, CERTs, and CSIRTs to detect, respond to, and share threat intelligence efficiently and securely, while maintaining full alignment with GDPR, Al Act and the NIS2 Directive.

About ACSOC

ACSOC brings together advanced tools, expertise, and innovation to support cybersecurity operations across the EU. It introduces:



- Al-powered threat intelligence and anomaly detection tools, including evolutions of Lucy (previously named Joshua) and Sofia platforms, part of the Almaviva CyberRiskVision framework, supporting SOCs, CERTs and CSIRTs operation.
- An Al based Federated Machine Learning approach enabling secure cooperation and data exchange across institutions without transferring sensitive data.
- Practical guidelines and procedure supporting SOC operations aligned with European cybersecurity regulations and policies.
- Support of SaaS operation simplifying SMEs and Public Authorities with limited inhouse cybersecurity capacity, offering simplified access to Cybersecurity services including threat information and indicators of compromise (IoCs).
- A viable tool (Euro Tech CDSES) in alternative to the use of comparable non **European Technology**
